Celebration of the 11th National Handloom Day by SHRADDHA

The 11th National Handloom Day was celebrated by *SHRADDHA* on the 7th August 2025 with a series of activities dedicated to promotion of handloom and increasing the earnings of the handloom weavers.

An article entitled "Celebrating 11th National Handloom Day – for whom and for what? Some introspections "An Experiment with Handloom in Odisha" written by Dr Sanjay Kumar Panda, President based on the experience of "SHRADDHA" was published in the Business and Political Daily, a reputed electronic media in its 7th August 2025 edition.

Celebration of the day was started in the forenoon with discussion on activities of *SHRADDHA* with the women weavers in the premises of the Anganwadi Center in the Maland village of Jagatsinghpur district. It was followed by plantation of saplings of fruit bearing trees. Each women weaver was given sapling for planation in her backyard. This was done to generate awareness about global warming and mobilize community support as a part of commitment to conservation of environment.

Shri Paul moderated the panel discussion on the 8th August on "ENTERPRENEURSHIP OPPORTUNITIES IN THE HANDLOOM SECTOR", which was chaired by DR BEENA M IAS, Development Commissioner of Handlooms New Delhi, and attended by other dignitaries.

Online seminar at 7.30PM

As a part of celebration of the 11th National Handloom Day, an online seminar was held at 7.30 PM, which had a wide range of participants from weavers in the villages to handloom enthusiasts from within the country and abroad.

Initiating the discussion, Shri Banshidhar Mahapatra, Secretary welcomed all the participants and gave a brief account of the activities of *SHRADDHA* for empowering the handloom weavers on sustainable basis by utilizing available resources, He stressed on the need for training the weavers for producing quality fabrics with new designs as per the taste of the customers.

Dr Sanjay Kumar Panda, President made a brief presentation on the major challenges faced by the handloom weavers and underlined the urgent need for increasing the earnings of the weavers. He referred to the activities of *SHRADDHA* covering four parts (i) supporting the low skill weavers for starting afresh, (ii) upgrading skill of the weavers for quality production with new design, (iii) provision of soft skills in quality control, packaging, marketing, use of mobile phone and online marketing and (iv) generating awareness among the consumers. He dealt with the recent experience with implementation of the project in Jagatsinghpur indicating that said intervention has led to increase in the income pf the women weavers by 50% and generated lots of hope among the weavers. He also discussed the impact of low-cost marketing interventions for enabling the skilled weavers to sale their fabrics directly to the inmates of high-end housing societies in Bhubaneswar which has given about 30 percent higher income, amount received online and getting connected with the consumers. He thanked the members and other concerned for their support.

Participating from Agartala, Tripura, Shri H K Pratihari expressed his satisfaction over the efforts and assured to extend his support. Maj Gen Atanu Ptanik (Retd) suggested to focus on introduction of modern design and supporting private entrepreneurs to start conversion of handloom fabrics in to garments for men and women. Shri Kshirod Mohapatra mentioned about the recent experience at Jagatsinghpur and the scope for weaving cotton fabrics on handloom and converting it to garments.

Shri Akshay Mohanty participated from USA and referred to the participation of *SHRADDHA* in the display and sale of handloom fabrics of Odisha in the Odisha day Celebration in Boston in April 2023 in collaboration with OSNE. He mentioned that it can be replicated for promoting marketing of Odisha handloom abroad. In this context, he referred to the event scheduled to be organized in Lincon Centre, New York in September.


